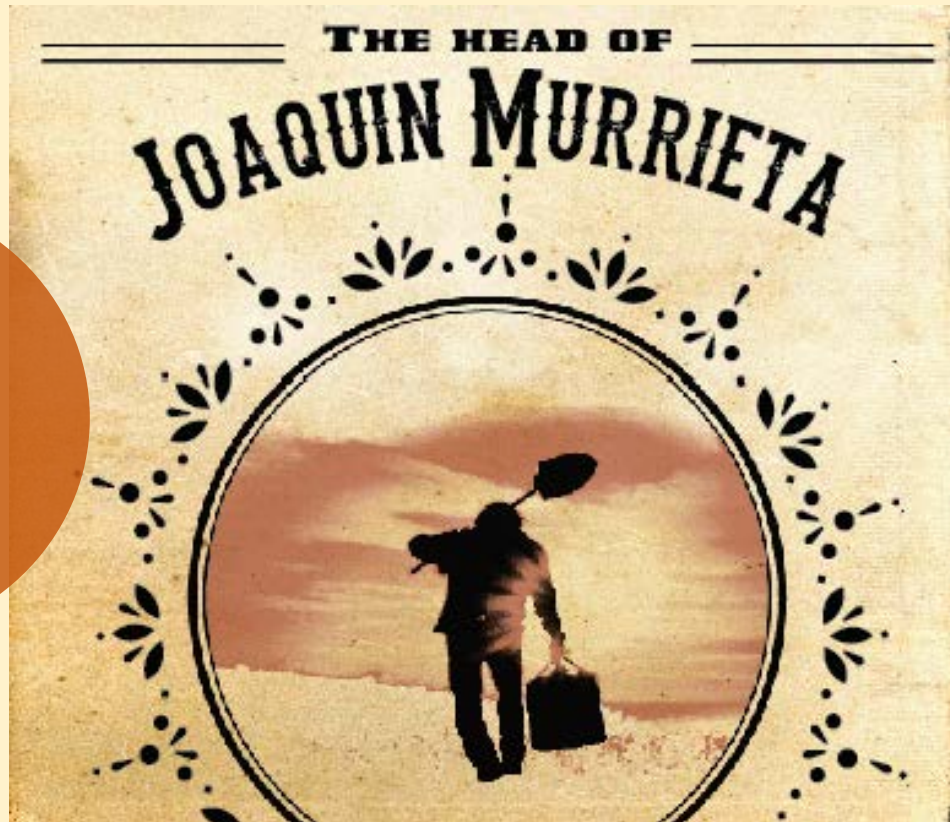


MEET AWARD-WINNING
